PROGRAM NEWS

Canadian sculptor, jewelry maker, and blacksmith, Jeff De Boer, creates impressive metal armor for cats and mice. They are modeled after periods in history, requiring Mr. De Boer to research armament styles of the time, create many drawings, clay models, then exacting patterns for the numerous metal pieces the armor may require (roughly 30 to 50 parts for a mouse, but up to 500 for a cat). He also creates his own tiny tools and rivets. This intense focus on accuracy and detail means that each piece takes around 30 to 50 hours to complete.

Jeff says that the question he is asked most often, is how he came up with the animal armor concept. He says he always wanted to be an artist, and was interested in armor since childhood. His father was a metalsmith, so he had access to the materials at an early age. He admits that he was also something of an outsider as a boy, and grew up relating to the underdogs of the world. He wondered if we could all perform feats of heroism if we only had a protective shell. He wore a partial suit of armor he had constructed to his own high school graduation!

He attended the Alberta College of Art and Design (Now Alberta University of the Arts), starting as a sculpture student. He gravitated

towards jewelry making because he preferred the skills, techniques, and scale of jewelry. But, ironically enough, he did not really like jewelry itself. He made his first mouse armor at college to fulfill jewelry class requirements with something that was NOT jewelry. But, ironically, he never got away from jewelry making, as he later was a jewelry and metals instructor at AUArts, and founded a company called Armet Canada that sells jewelry and other items online. It features unique, affordable pieces by himself and former students, among others.

But it is the animal armor that has given Mr. De Boer international recognition. He has created over 500 pieces. In an article in *National Geographic*, he is confirmed as the only artist in the world doing this type of work. He has delivered a TED Talk about innovation (and is wearing a chain-mail necktie in the video). A more dubious claim to fame is having his work appear in *Ripley's Believe It or Not! Encyclopedia of the Bizarre*. He has patrons and collectors, and sells his work worldwide. He is grateful for the development of the internet, because he says his work does not fit in neatly into any category in the art world, and without the internet, he does not think he would have found enough of a market to support himself as an artist.

Since it is also the internet that is allowing us to have the opportunity to meet this truly one-of-a-kind artist, I am grateful for it, as well. Please join the ZOOM meeting on February 13. It is sure to be fascinating.

Follow up News - You will remember our guest Artist in May 2023, James Sisti. He is a nature journalist and adventurer who spoke at our meeting, and also conducted a wellattended workshop for us at the New York-New Jersey Trail Conference Headquarters. At that time, he had been working on a book, which he hoped to have ready for us, but getting married and other projects delayed its publication. It was just released in December. I bought one, and give it a thumbs up. It is small in size, so it can be carried while hiking. I would say that it is aimed towards those with little experience, and shows simple drawings that might inspire beginners. It is quite inexpensive and would make a good gift.
